
## FEATURED EXHIBITION

In 1922, two years after it was organized as a one-room facility in the Board of Trade building at Main and Paine Streets, the East Aurora library moved to the circa 1835 house on the northwest corner of Main Street and Whaley Avenue. Evelyn Riley Griggs bought the house and donated it to the library. However, by the early 1960s, the library had outgrown it.

construction starts next year. The two-story frame building was built in 1835. The new one-story brick structure will occupy the same site.

## New Library Building to Replace Structure Erected by Pratt in 1835

An old landmark, the dwelling occupied by the East Aurora Free Library, built in 1835, will next year be replaced by a onestory modern structure. Plans are now under way for the removal of the building by the Town of Aurora Board.

It was in early 1920 that a small group of women composed of members of the College Club and other organizations, realizing the need of a library, placed the proposition before citizens of the village. A committee made a house-to-house canvass for charter members. The canvass was a success.


It was April 19, 1920, that about 200 citizens attended a meeting at the Board of Trade Building, now site of East Aurora Village Hall, and the library was a reality. There were 700 books catalogued on the shelves of a room in the Board of Trade.

One of the speakers, James W. Persons, said that the library has a fine start, but only a start. Everyone must continue working for the ultimate success of the library and the united effort will accomplish wonders, he edded.

At the end of the first year reports showed 8,000 circulation and 3,960 books on the shelves. The state charter had been received and the library was registered with the University of the State of New York

**In 1962**, the Town Board announced plans to replace the library building with a more modern facility. The town also planned an addition to the library in West Falls.



## East Aurora Library to Relocate Until New Building Is Completed

Because of the necessity of Because of the necessity of vacating the East Aurora Free Library building at Main and Whaley due to construction of a new library by the Town of Aurora, the library will be closed from Jan. 14 to Jan. 19. The library will reopen in its new temporary quarters Monday, Jan. 16, at 663 Main St. Miss Thelma L. Harrington, librarian, says the library will

remain open in this location the usual hours until the new build-

remain open in this location the usual hours until the new building is completed.

Temporarily, books will have to be returned when the library is open because there will be no outside book drop. Miss Harrington says that no fines or overtime charges will be made for books due the week that the library is closed.

Preparation is under way for asking for bids on the new library at the Main-Whaley site. The township has been deeded 30 feet of land adjoining the east line of the library property which will provide ample offstreet parking.

The one-story new library will

The one-story new library will face Main St. and will replace the building now in use which was erected in 1834. The building where the temporary library will be located at 663 Main is owned by the East Aurora Hardware Store.

In January 1963, in preparation for the new building, library operations temporarily moved to 663 Main Street, a building owned by the East Aurora Hardware Store.






In **March 1963**, the circa 1835 house that was home to the library since 1922 was demolished to make way for the new, modern library at Main Street and Whaley Avenue.





**Throughout 1963**, construction of the new library building took place. Facing several setbacks, the project was delayed a few months. Note in the bottom photograph the fireplace and chimney that still exist in the library today.
